
# Simple Verb Tenses

Understanding the three simple tenses, or times, of a verb is not difficult. A verb is in either the **present** tense, the **past** tense, or the **future** tense. (For more information about verb tenses, turn to 448.1-448.3 in *Write Source 2000.)* 



# EXAMPLES

#### Present Tense:

A present-tense verb expresses an action that is going on now or shows something that happens regularly.

People cross the country using the same routes the pioneers used.

### Past Tense:

A past tense verb expresses an action that happened in the past. Many past tense verbs end in *ed*.

Pioneers crossed the country in wagon trains.

## Future Tense:

A future tense verb states an action that will take place in the future. A helping verb (will, shall, could) helps a verb show the future tense.

You will cross the country along a pioneer route if you follow Interstate 80.
