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Inference or Detail?

What is an inference?

An inference is a conclusion a reader can arrive at through reasoning based on evidence (details) in a text. In other words, an inference is something a reader can figure out through reading a text.

What is a detail?

In reading, a detail is the textual evidence that leads us to and supports the inference that we make. In other words, details are words and phrases that are stated by the author.

Ex: I inferred from their laughter that the children were having fun.
